Tips Before Surgery

Before Your Surgery



- Ask if you should take or stop any medications before the surgery
- Ask if you should take your vitamins, herbals, and

over-the-counter medications

- Bring a list of all medications you are taking at home
- Ask if there is any special test that you need before surgery
- Ask if you can eat or drink before your procedure
- Bring a list of any questions you may have to ask your doctor
- Prepare your home for your return from hospital
- Arrange for a family or friend to help you at home
- You may be asked to take a shower with a special soap to help reduce germs on skin before going into surgery

The Day of Surgery

- Bring someone with you to the hospital
- Do not wear make-up before surgery
- Leave valuables and jewelry at home
- Bring your insurance cards
- Wear loose fitting clothes
- Make sure your hospital wristband has your correct name and birth date on it
- Healthcare team members will check your hospital wristband



- Make sure the healthcare team discusses your surgery with you
- The doctor may mark the site for surgery
- Once in a while, patients may remember events during surgery. If this happens, tell your doctor.

After Surgery

- Ask for a written list of what medications you are to take at home
- Ask if you will need any medical devices like crutches, walker, or wheelchair
- Ask what diet and activity you can do at home
- Make sure you have someone who can help you at home or talk to a social worker to get help
- Ask the staff to show you and your caregiver any tasks that require special skills (like changing a bandage or giving a shot). Then show them that you can do these tasks.
- Before you go home, make sure you have an appointment to see your doctor
- Ask about problems to watch for and what to do about them
- Write down a name and phone number of a person to call if you have problems
